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Background, Vision and Mission

Background

TBB (CAMBODIA) MICROFINANCE INSTITUTION PLC. (Hereinafter referred to as TBBMFI) is a public limited company and a subsidiary of TAIWAN BUSINESS BANK which is a specialized bank in Taiwan charged with providing financial assistance and guidance to SMEs and has developed the field of SME financial services for more than 40 years.

TBBMFI is licensed by the National Bank of Cambodia as a MFI in June 2015 to provide funding to commercial or individual purposes of Cambodian people as well as customers from Taiwan and support the monetary and economic environment of Cambodia.

Vision

To be the most people-centric company in Cambodia and build up a place where customers can seek and utilize the products with facility.

Mission

TBBMFI seeks to be one of the providers of ethical credit products in Cambodia and develops new products as appropriate to support Cambodian people to grow up the economic scale. In doing so, TBBMFI will observe the highest principles of morality and best international banking practice to conduct its business in line with the laws and regulations of the Kingdom of Cambodia.



Message from the Chief Executive Officer (CEO)



The International Monetary Fund (IMF) forecasts that global economy in 2024 will be another year of slowdown but growth steadily. The strong performance of the US economy is expected to lead the global economy in overcoming many challenges, including persistent high inflation and the ongoing struggles of China's real estate industry, which have led to continued weak domestic demand and deteriorating prospects. Meanwhile, Europe faces insufficient consumer confidence, weak demand, slowing economic growth, and rapidly falling inflation rates. Additionally, the effects of conflicts and regional

wars in the Middle East are causing regional instability, leading to rising oil prices and increased transportation costs, which will contribute to sustained global inflation.

The IMF forecasts that the global real GDP growth rate for 2024 will be 3.2%, the same as in 2023. In the US, due to better-than-expected employment rates and consumer spending, the economic growth rate for 2024 is projected to be 2.7%. The economic growth rate of the Eurozone in 2024 is estimated to be 0.8%. In China, the economic growth rate for 2024 is projected to be 4.6%.

According to Cambodian government statistics, GDP of Cambodia in 2023 was approximately \$32.17 billion, reflecting a 5.6% increase over the previous year, with a per capita GDP of \$1,917. Industry grew by 5%, Service by 8.1%, and Agriculture by 0.9%. The average inflation rate was 2.5%. The average exchange rate of USD to KHR was 1:4065. Foreign exchange reserves amounted to \$19.44 billion, sufficient to cover 6.9 months of imports. The broad money supply (M2) increased by 12.5% compared to the previous year.

The economic growth rate for 2024 is estimated to reach 6.6%, with GDP expected to reach \$35.17 billion and per capita GDP rising to \$2,071. The average inflation rate is projected to remain at 2.5%. The exchange rate of USD to KHR is expected to stay around 1:4065. Foreign exchange reserves are anticipated to reach \$21.29 billion, enough to cover 6.6 months of imports. Growth rate of Industry is projected to be 8.5%, Service at 6.9%, and Agriculture at 1.1%.

According to a press release from The Association of Banks in Cambodia (ABC), the total assets of financial institutions in Cambodia reached \$77.4 billion in 2023, accounting for 243% of Cambodia's GDP. In 2022, the total assets of financial institutions were \$67.9 billion, accounting for 230% of GDP, indicating the industry's continued stability and growth.





Cambodia's banking market is highly competitive. As of December 2023, there are 58 commercial banks, 9 specialized banks, and 87 microfinance institutions in Cambodia.

Due to rising borrowing cost and increasing bad debt rates, the net income of commercial banks dropped to \$490 million in 2023, a sharp decline of 45% from the previous year. The ROA decreased from 1.4% the previous year to 0.6% last year, while the ROE fell from 10.2% to 3.4%. The NPL ratio rose from 3.1% to 5.4%.

Since the establishment in 2015, Our company has been dedicated to serving the community by assisting residents with land and house purchases, business working capital, etc., To further devoting the local consumer credit market, we established the BKK Branch in 2017. The scale of our loans has grown year by year, as of December 2023, we had issued credit to 142 households with loan balance of \$40,881 thousands.

In recent years, factors such as the pandemic, the Russia-Ukraine war, inflation, and rising US dollar costs, etc. have led to a sluggish Cambodian economy. Customers' repayment abilities have generally declined, causing the NPL ratio to increase year by year. We have made every effort to assist customers facing repayment difficulties by providing relief measures, alleviating their repayment pressures and assisting in sales of property. We have successfully negotiated and resolved 13 NPL cases, approximately \$2,693 thousand. However, due to the overall economic situation not yet showing signs of improvement, the amount of NPL increased to \$5,408 thousand by the end of last year, with an NPL ratio of 13.23%, the highest record since our establishment.

Looking forward, we will continue to assist customers who are willing but struggling to make payments by offering grace periods or helping with property sales to reduce NPL and improve asset quality.

Since our establishment, we have consistently implemented corporate governance, compliance with laws and regulations, and strengthened various risk management measures. We encourage staff to engage in diverse learning opportunities, conduct internal training, and support participation in external professional training to enhance their service levels. With the efforts of our dedicated colleagues and vendors, the upgrade of our company's information system is almost complete. The completion of upgrade will enhance the accuracy and efficiency of various business and accounting processes, enabling TBBMFI to develop better in the future.



In recent years, economic recovery has been impacted by Geopolitical conflicts and the slowdown of economic growth in major investing countries like China, along with persistent inflation and high financing costs. However, since the inauguration of Prime Minister Hun Manet, he has led various government departments in actively seeking investment from friendly countries and continues to strengthen public infrastructure, making a solid foundation for Cambodia's long-term development. The outlook remains promising. We will continue to work with the government by assisting residents in various financing services to strive for a better future and contribute our modest efforts to Cambodia's economic development.

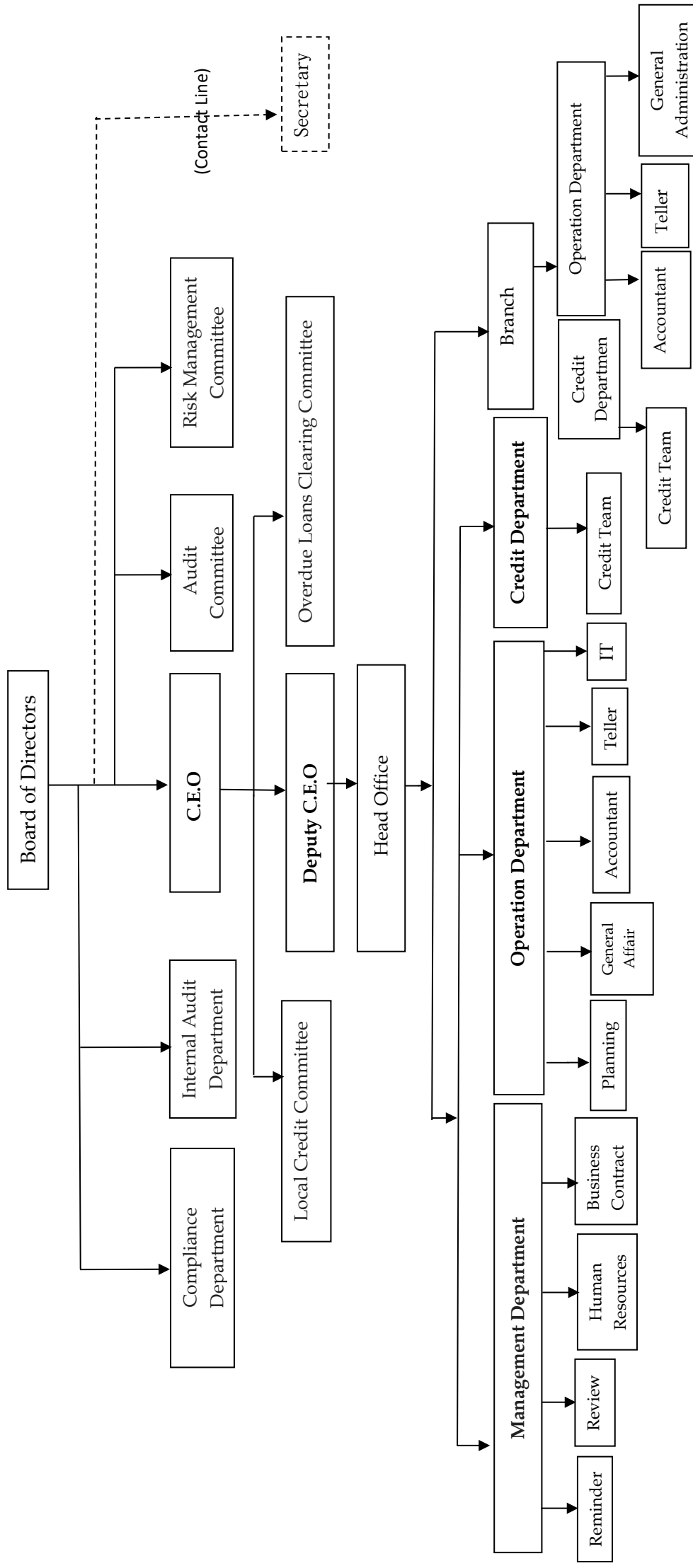

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

DIRECTORS' REPORT

The directors hereby submit their report together with the audited financial statements of the Company for the year ended 31 December 2023.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activities of the Company are to provide loans and other financial services to local customers through its head office and branch in Phnom Penh.

There have been no significant changes in the nature of these principal activities during the year.

DIVIDENDS

No dividend has been paid or declared by the Company since the end of the previous year.

The Board of Directors do not recommend the payment of dividends for the year ended 31 December 2023.

RESERVES AND PROVISIONS

There were no material transfers to reserves and no material provision during the year other than those amount as disclosed in the financial statements.

BAD AND DOUBTFUL LOANS

Before the financial statements of the Company were prepared, the directors took reasonable steps to ascertain that action had been taken in relation to the writing off of bad loans and the making of allowance for doubtful loans and had satisfied themselves that all known bad loans had been written off and that adequate allowance had been made for doubtful loans.

At the date of this report, the directors are not aware of any circumstances which would render the amount written off for bad loans or the amount of allowance for doubtful loans in the financial statements of the Company inadequate to any substantial extent.

ASSETS

Before the financial statements of the Company were prepared, the directors took reasonable steps to ensure that any assets which were unlikely to be realised in the ordinary course of business including their values as shown in the accounting records of the Company had been written down to an amount which they might be expected so to realise.

At the date of this report, the directors are not aware of any circumstances which would render the values attributed to the current assets in the financial statements of the Company misleading.



VALUATION METHODS

At the date of this report, the directors are not aware of any circumstances which have arisen which render adherence to the existing methods of valuation of assets or liabilities of the Company misleading or inappropriate.

Independent auditor's report

To the shareholders of TBB (Cambodia) Microfinance Institution Plc

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of TBB (Cambodia) Microfinance Institution Plc. (the "Company"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2023, and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows of the Company for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, as set out on pages 5 to 26.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company as at 31 December 2023, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the Cambodian International Financial Reporting Standards for Small and Medium-sized Entities ("CIFRS for SMEs").

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Cambodian International Standards on Auditing ("CISAs"). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* ("IESBA Code"), and the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Cambodia, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditors' Report Thereon

The directors of the Company are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the Annual Report and Directors' Report (but does not include the financial statements of the Company and our auditors' report thereon), which we obtained prior to the date of this auditors' report, and other sections included in the annual report, which are expected to be made available to us after that date.



Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditors' Report Thereon (Continued)

Our opinion on the financial statements of the Company does not cover the Directors' Report and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements of the Company, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements of the Company or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed on the other information that we obtained prior to the date of this auditors' report, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of the Directors for the Financial Statements

The directors of the Company are responsible for the preparation of financial statements so as to give a true and fair view in accordance with the CIFRS for SMEs. The directors are also responsible for such internal controls as the directors determine are necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements of the Company that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements of the Company, the directors are responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

The directors of the Company are responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements of the Company as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with CISA's will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with CISA's, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements of the Company, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.
- evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures by the directors.

If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditors' report to the related disclosures in the financial statements of the Company or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditors' report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern.
- evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements of the Company, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the directors regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

Notes to the financial statements

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

TBB (Cambodia) Microfinance Institution Plc. is a public limited company incorporated in the Kingdom of Cambodia under the Registration No. Co. 1506 E/2015 dated 28 April 2015 issued by the Ministry of Commerce (“MOC”). On 12 June 2015, the Company obtained its license from the National Bank of Cambodia. The Company re-registered with the MOC on 13 December 2017 to operate as a microfinance institution, under the Registration No. 00029793.

The directors regard Taiwan Business Bank, Ltd., a company incorporated in Taiwan and listed on the Taiwan Stock Exchange, as the immediate holding company of the Company. The controlling shareholder of the Company is Bank of Taiwan, an indirect wholly owned subsidiary of the Ministry of Finance of Taiwan.

The registered office and principal place of business of the Company is located in No. 2E-2F, St. 315, Sangkat Boeung Kak 1, Khan Toul Kork, Phnom Penh, Kingdom of Cambodia.

The principal activities of the Company are to provide loans and other financial services to local customers through its head office and branch in Phnom Penh. There have been no significant changes in the nature of these principal activities during the year.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

2.1. Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the Company are prepared in accordance with the Cambodian International Financial Reporting Standard for Small and Medium-Sized Entities (“CIFRS for SMEs”), following Circular No. 004 MoEF.NAC dated 3 January 2019 issued by the National Accounting Council of the Ministry of Economy and Finance on the implementation of the accounting standards for banks and financial institutions.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the CIFRS for SMEs requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the accounting policies. Areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimations are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in Note 4.

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to the periods presented in these financial statements, unless otherwise stated.

2.2. Basis of aggregation

The Company’s financial statements comprise the financial statements of the head office and its branch. All inter-branch balances and transactions have been eliminated.



2.3. Functional and presentation currency

The national currency of Cambodia is the Khmer Riel ("KHR"). However, as the Company transacts its business and maintains its accounting records primarily in United States Dollar ("USD"), the directors have determined the USD to be the Company's currency for measurement and presentation purposes as it reflects the economic substance of the underlying events and circumstances of the Company.

The translations of USD amounts into KHR presented in the financial statements are included solely to comply with the Law on Accounting and Auditing and have been using the prescribed official annual closing and average exchange rate of USD1 to KHR4,085 and USD1 to KHR4,110 respectively, for the year ended 31 December 2023 (2022: KHR4,117 and KHR4,087) as announced by the National Bank of Cambodia.

These convenience translations should not be construed as representations that the USD amounts represent, or have been or could be, converted into KHR at that or any other rate.

3. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

3.1 Financial instruments

Financial assets

The Company's financial assets include cash and cash equivalents, loans to customers and other assets (excluding prepayments and capital guarantee deposits with the NBC). These financial assets are recognised initially at the transaction price. Subsequently, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provisions for impairment.

The carrying amounts of the financial assets as at the reporting date was USD43,614,763 (2022: USD49,442,462).

When there is objective evidence that the carrying amounts of receivables are not recoverable, an impairment loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

Financial liabilities

The Company's financial liabilities include borrowings and other liabilities (excluding other taxes payable). Financial liabilities are recognised initially at transaction price. After initial recognition, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Other liabilities are on normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

The carrying amounts of the financial liabilities as at the reporting date was USD24,413,396 (2022: USD29,760,923).

3.2 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less where the Company has full ability to withdraw for general purpose whenever needed and is subjected to insignificant risk of change in value.



3.3 Loans to customers

Loans to customers are recognised initially at fair value plus any directly attributable transaction costs and are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any provision for impairment.

Loans are written off to the statement of comprehensive income when the loans are provisioned in full and when the certainty of being uncollectable is proven. Loans written off are taken out of the outstanding loan portfolio and deducted from the allowance for loans to customers.

Recoveries of loans previously written off are recorded as other operating income in the statement of comprehensive income. Reversal of previous allowance is presented in allowance expense in the statement of comprehensive income.

(i) Provision for impairment

(a) Specific impairment

The Company recognises an allowance for loans to customers based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Company expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate. The expected cash flows will include cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

(b) Collective impairment

The Company does not track changes in credit risk, but instead recognises a loss allowance at each reporting date. The Company has established a provision matrix that is based on its historical credit loss experience. Collective impairment is computed using the provision rates and a loss given default rates that is based on historical recoveries.

(ii) Regulatory provision

Credit classification and provisioning for financial institutions in accordance with Prakas No. B7-017-344, dated 1 December 2017 as issued by the ("NBC") provides guidance on credit classification and regulatory provisioning for financial institution in Cambodia, as summaries below:

Article 73 of Prakas on Credit Risk Grading and Impairment Provisioning requires the Company to compare the provision calculated in accordance with the CIFRS for SMEs and Prakas No 7-017-344 and, accordingly:

- in case the regulatory provision calculated in accordance with the said Prakas is lower than the impairment calculated in accordance with CIFRS for SMEs, the Company shall record the provision calculated in accordance with CIFRS for SMEs.
- in case the regulatory provision calculated in accordance with the said Prakas higher than the impairment calculated in accordance with the CIFRS for SMEs, the Company shall record the provision calculated in accordance with CIFRS for SMEs and transfer the difference from retained earnings or accumulated loss account into regulatory reserve in the equity section of the statement or financial position.

3.4 Property and equipment

Property and equipment are recognised initially at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes all cost incurred to bring the asset to the condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of parts that are replaced is derecognised. All other repairs and maintenances are charged to profit or loss during the period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation of property and equipment are charged to the statement of comprehensive income using the straight-line method over the useful lives of the individual assets as follows:

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

The carrying amount of an asset is written-down immediately to its recoverable amount if its carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.



Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in the profit or loss.

3.5 Intangible assets

Intangible assets consist of computer software and are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment, if any. Acquired computer software is capitalised on the basis of the cost incurred to acquire the specific software and bring it into use. During the year, the Company acquired new computer software, which was capitalised and put into use starting from December 2023. However, the software is still in the process of being fully implemented. Intangible assets are amortised using the straight-line method over 2 to 5 years.

3.6 Employee benefits

(i) Severance indemnity

The Company calculates severance indemnity by applying a fixed rate 5% of the employee's monthly basic salary. This obligation will be settled upon resignation or retirement of the employee. Employees are entitled to this benefit based on their length of service (after completion of probation period) of regular employee, except termination due to serious offense. This obligation earns no interest.

The Company recognises the provision for the severance pay in the financial statements and withdrawal can only be made upon resignation or retirement.

(ii) Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are expensed as the related service is provided. A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid if the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

3.7 Impairment of assets

(i) Financial assets

A financial asset is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial asset is considered to be impaired if objective evidence indicates that one or more events have had a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of that asset.

Individually significant financial assets are tested for impairment on an individual basis. The remaining financial assets are assessed collectively in groups that share similar credit risk characteristics.

All impairment losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

An impairment loss is reversed if the reversal can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised.



(ii) Non-financial assets

Assets that are subject to depreciation or amortisation are assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication that the assets are impaired. Where there is any indication that an asset might be impaired, the carrying value of the asset (or cash-generating unit “CGU” to which the asset has been allocated) is tested for impairment.

An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset’s carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset’s (or CGU’s) fair value less costs to sell and its value in use. For the purpose of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash flows (CGUs). Non-financial assets suffered an impairment are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at each reporting date.

3.8 Income taxes

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax, and are recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income.

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred tax is recognised on differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and their corresponding tax bases (known as temporary differences).

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the taxable profit (tax loss) of the periods in which it expects the deferred tax asset to be realised or the deferred tax liability to be settled, on the basis of tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

3.9 Borrowings

Borrowings are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently stated at amortised cost.

3.10 Interest income and expense recognition

Interest income and expense are recognised in profit or loss using the effective interest method. The “effective interest rate” is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments and receipts through the expected life of the financial asset or financial liability (or, where appropriate, a shorter period) to the carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. When calculating the effective interest rate, the Company estimates future cash flows considering all contractual terms of the financial instrument, but not future credit losses.

Income from the various activities of the Company is accrued using the following basis:

- interest income from loans to customers is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest method.
- fees and commission are recognised as income over the term of the loan using effective interest method. Unamortised loan fees and commissions are recognised as “unearned income”, under other liabilities.



3.11 Operating leases

Leases in which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases. Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease.

4 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS

Significant areas of estimation, uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have significant effect in determining the amounts recognised in the financial statements include the followings:

4.1 Impairment loss on loans to customers

The Company uses a provision matrix to calculate the allowance for its loans to customers. The provision rates are based on days past due for groupings of various customer segments that have similar loss patterns. The provision matrix is initially based on the Company's historical observed default rates. The Company calibrates the matrix to adjust the historical credit loss experience with historical recoveries. At every reporting date, the historical observed default rates are updated.

The assessment of the correlation between historical observed default rates and allowance for loans to customers is a significant estimate. The amount of allowance for loans to customers is sensitive to changes in circumstances. The Company's historical credit loss experience may also not be representative of customer's actual default in the future. The impact of provisioning on the Company's loans to customers is disclosed in Note 7.

4.2 Income taxes

Significant judgement is required in determining the capital allowances and deductibility of certain expenses during the estimation of the provision for income taxes. There are many transactions and calculations for which the ultimate tax determination is uncertain during the ordinary course of business. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recorded, such differences will impact the income tax and deferred income tax provisions in the year in which such determination is made.

The income tax expense of the Company is disclosed in Note 15 to the financial statements.

This is not available for use in the Company's day-to-day operations and is only refundable when the Company voluntarily liquidates or cease its operation.

The capital guarantee deposit earns interest at the rate of 1.26% per annum (2022: 0.37% per annum).

18. TAXATION CONTINGENCIES

The taxation system in Cambodia is characterised by numerous taxes and frequently changing legislation, which is often unclear, contradictory and subjected to interpretation. Often different interpretation exists among numerous taxation authorities and jurisdictions. Taxes are subjected to review and investigation by a number of authorities, who are enabled by law to impose severe fines, penalties and interest charges.

These facts may create tax risks in Cambodia, substantially more compared to other countries. Management believes that tax liabilities have been adequately provided based on its interpretation of tax legislations. However, the relevant authorities may have differing interpretations and effects could be significant.

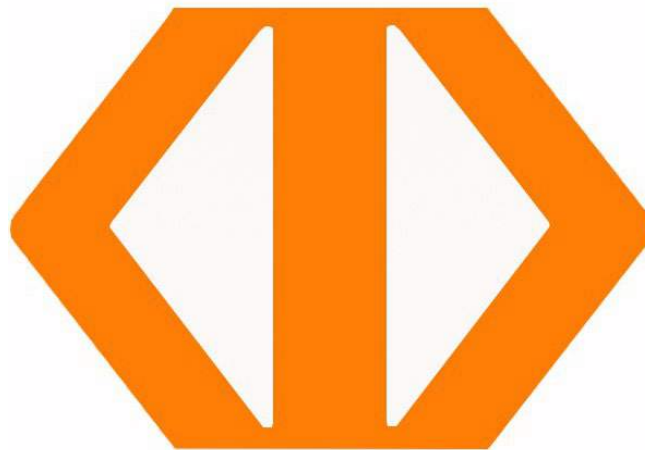

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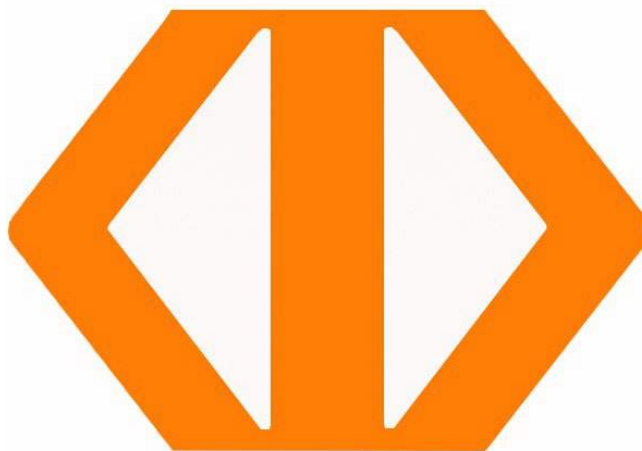
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
